Creating a New Wetlands Habitat in  
the Heart of London

The Wildfowl & Wetlands Trust (WWT) is a leading UK conservation organisation preserving wetlands and their wildlife. Founder Sir Peter Scott's ambition was to create a wetlands centre in London.

In 1989 a site was identified. Four Victorian reservoirs had become redundant in Barnes. WWT entered into a partnership with the reservoir owners, Thames Water. Ten hectares of the site was sold to Berkeley Homes, who became a third party to the partnership.

The scheme for the visitor centre and wetlands habitat was funded by the residential development of adjacent land. John Thompson & Partners were masterplanners for the residential scheme and architects for the visitor centre.

### Project Delivery

- A visitor centre, constructed from sustainable materials, located at the public entrance to the wetlands.
- Incorporation of exhibition and display spaces, a glass-walled observatory, lecture theatre, shop, gallery, restaurant and café within the visitor centre design.
- Two and three storey hides set within the landscape, away from the main building.
- One and two storey buildings grouped around a landscaped central courtyard.
- A unique blend of conservation centre and visitor attraction, drawing in 170,000 visitors per year.
